# Principal's Message

#### NAPLAN Online

NAPLAN Online begins on Wednesday next week (15/3) and runs until 24/3.

NAPLAN Online allows students to move along pathways that are aligned with their answers. This will give students more of an opportunity to work through questions at their level. Our NAPLAN data is quite often not what it should be as a number of students, particular older students, choose to opt out. We understand that NAPLAN can cause some students and families some anxiety. NAPLAN shows what students can do at one point in time. It would be heartening for students to show their resilience and have a positive growth mindset and to have a go.

#### **R-5** swimming

R-5 swimming will be at Starplex in Week 10 of this term, Monday 3rd April to Thursday 6th April (Friday is Good Friday).

# Principal's Message (continued)

frameworks/assessments we use at Munno Para PS and how they fit into your child's education.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, our main Site Improvement Plan focus continues to be reading. We are in our third year of this work and next year we will shift our focus to Numeracy, whilst maintaining our strong, established practices in reading and Literacy. Firstly, if you have a child or children in reception to year 2, you may hear them or their teachers speak about Initialit, Heggerty and 'OG'.

#### Initialit

IlnitiaLit is an evidence-based whole-class literacy program providing all children with the essential core knowledge and strong foundations to become successful readers and writers. InitiaLit is a three-year program, covering the first three years of school (Foundation to Year 2). The focus in the first two years is on explicitly teaching students the phonics code.

Phonics is the understanding that there is a predictable relationship between the individual sounds (the phonemes) of spoken language and the letters (graphemes) that represent those sounds in written language. Phonics instruction is most effective when it begins in the first or second year of formal schooling (NICHD, 2000) and, for most students, most letter-sound relationships can be taught within two years. Our explicit phonics instruction begins in Reception and we use a systematic synthetic phonics framework (Initialit) to underpin our practice. The sounds are taught in a specific order (not alphabetically). This enables children to begin building words as early as possible, children are taught the 44 main letter sounds. This includes alphabet sounds as well as digraphs such as sh, th, ai and ue. They are not taught in alphabetical order. The first group (s, a, t, I, p, n) has been chosen because they make more simple three-letter words than any other six letters.

#### Heggerty

The Heggerty Curriculum includes explicit instruction in the following phonological and phonemic awareness skills:

- Rhyming
- Initial Phoneme Isolation
- Blending
- Isolating final and medial phonemes (sounds)
- Segmenting
- Adding Phonemes
- Deleting Phonemes
- Substituting Phonemes

Phonological awareness is the understanding of different ways that oral language can be divided into smaller components and manipulated." (Chard and Dickson, 1999) Phonological awareness refers to the bigger "chunks" or "parts" of language. When we ask students to rhyme, blend small words to make a compound word, break words apart into syllables or onset-rime, we are working at the phonological awareness level. Phonemic awareness is the understanding that spoken words are made of *individual sounds* called *phonemes*. A phoneme is the smallest unit of sound we hear in a word. Phonemic awareness falls underneath the umbrella as a sub-category of phonological awareness.

#### "OG"

The Orton-Gillingham (OG) Approach is a direct, explicit, multisensory, structured, sequential, diagnostic, and prescriptive way to teach literacy when reading, writing, and spelling does not come easily to individuals, such as those with dyslexia.

At Munno Para PS we are using "OG" as our phonics intervention for those students who are not progressing at the rate we expect in Initialit.

In years 3-6 we continue to explicitly teach the skills required in order for students to not only decode (read) different texts but comprehend (understand) what they are reading.

This year, across all year 3-6 classes, students have been assessed in the first three weeks of the year with the DIBELS – Oral Fluency test. DIBELS is the acronym for the name of the assessment. Within that there are multiple tests. Our students will sit the Oral Fluency test (ORF) and MAZE which is a comprehension test.

We then use the data from those tests to determine whether or not any students require intervention.

The intervention could be OG, Heggerty or something similar to Heggerty for older students, called Kilpatrick or MacqLit (which is a primary years phonics intervention). The students access these interventions in 1:1 or small groups with a teacher or trained SSO.

#### **Spelling Mastery**

Spelling Mastery provides structured lessons to effectively and efficiently teach the spelling skills students need to become proficient readers and writers using the following approaches:

- Phonemic approach helps beginning spellers learn the relationships between spoken sounds and written letters and then apply them to spelling
- Morphemic approach exposes advanced spellers to prefixes, bases, and suffixes
- Whole-word approach gives spellers at all levels the meaning and root of a word and shows how the word's spelling is influence

As you can see we have a lot happening in Literacy. We are also using the Department for Education's newly developed Curriculum resources and Units of Work to ensure we are addressing and explicitly teaching all areas of English, not just reading.
