Before School

The school yard is not supervised until 8:45am and no-one should be onsite until that time. The gates open just prior to this. Students can go straight to their class and wait for the bell, when the classrooms will be opened by the teacher. Playgrounds are out of bounds for everyone before school.

After School

School finishes at 3pm. Students should be picked up promptly at that time. At 3:15pm when yard duty finishes, any students still at school will be brought to the office and the parent/carer will be contacted.

Late arrivals and Early Pick Ups

A friendly reminder that late arrivals are required to sign in at the front office (from 9am). Please remind students when they come in late, to go directly to the front office to obtain a late slip. When picking your child/ren up early, the parent/carer needs to come to front office, sign out their child/ren and take the sign out slip to class and give it to the classroom teacher.

CURRICULUM AT MPPS

Hi everyone


If you don't already know me, my name is Mrs G and I am lucky enough to work in the role of curriculum coordinator at our wonderful school this year.

We have lots of exciting things happening in classrooms with the first week of formal teaching starting this week. Across all year levels we are continuing with our implementation of structured literacy blocks to support students' development of skills in reading and writing.

Our R-2 students will be engaging in InitiaLit lessons throughout this year. InitiaLit is an evidence-based whole-class literacy program providing all children with the essential core knowledge and strong foundations to become successful readers and writers. Students have been busy learning the routines to effectively participate in these lessons and reviewing their phonics knowledge from last year, ready for all the new and exciting learning to come this year.

Our Years 3-6 students will be engaging in Spelling Mastery lessons again this year. Students have started in their groups this week which has been a great opportunity for them to get to know and work with a wider range of students, teachers and SSOs across the school. Spelling Mastery approaches spelling through strategies, patterns and rules. The straightforward lessons in Spelling Mastery combine phonemic, morphemic, and whole-word instruction to make spelling easier to learn, leading the way to more effective writing. Students in Years 3-6 have also been busy learning the routines to effectively participate in daily reviews and fluency pairs as part of their literacy learning.

This year all classes across the school will be exploring and trialling Maths learning through the lens of the new South Australian Curriculum. Students have started to have a go at solving some mathematical problems to stimulate discussions around the dispositions of being resilient, reflective and resourceful when working in Maths. These three dispositions are going to be a focus this year for building positive mindsets around Maths. We are also going to be implementing an exciting new Mathematics intervention program called Bond Blocks to support our student's development of core Maths skills. There will be more information to come about this soon.









FIRST NATIONS AT MPPS

As the Aboriginal Education Teacher here at Munno Para Primary School I am very lucky to work with two amazing ACEOs (Aboriginal Community Education Officer) who work with both me and our First Nations students. Ryan is our new part-time ACEO who comes to us with a wealth of knowledge, including a background in supporting Indigenous voice in parliament which led to him being Young Citizen of the Year. Glenice has been here at MPPS for 11 years and has established relationships with many families around the school, including running a successful playgroup on a Friday morning.

We run a few different programs for our First Nations students including Malpa and Yaitya Tirkanthi. Both of these supports our students cultural background, knowledge and identity. They are involved in lessons around traditional vs Western medicine, traditional foods, caring for Country, music, art, dance, and more. This term we have also been lucky enough to secure a First Nations artist through Carclew, who will be working with some of our students to make some amazing artworks.

We are based in D3 in 2025, please come and visit us anytime, we would love to see you!






APPLYING FOR A SCHOOL CARD

You can access the online forms from any device that gets internet, including mobile devices, such as tablets and smart phones, as well as laptops and computers.

Applying online is easy! Simply follow the steps below.

STEP 1

Visit sa.gov.au/education/schoolcard

STEP 2

Select the type of School Card you would like to apply for (for example 'Type A') and follow the prompts.

STEP 3

Complete all mandatory fields.

Please note: you cannot submit your application unless all mandatory fields are complete.

STEP 4

Once you have completed a page click on the 'NEXT' button.

STEP 5

Once you have filled out all pages click the 'SUBMIT' button.

Please note: if you exit the form without clicking 'SUBMIT' your details will be lost.

You can save the form, and return to complete it at another time, by clicking on the 'SAVE' button.

6 Helpful Tips for **School Zones**

As parents and caregivers, we have a great responsibility to ensure children

stay safe in school zones. We also play a key role in educating children about road safety.

Here are 6 helpful tips for safety in school zones.

Consider alternative transport modes to reduce the number of vehicles in school zones.

Allow enough time to take your child to the school gate safely and without rushing.

Always observe parking signs and speed limits in and around school zones. They are designed to keep your child safe.

Talk about traffic safety with your child. Identify and discuss places where it is safe to out of the car and to cross the road.

Teach your child now to cross the 'stop, look, listen and think' process – stop Teach your child how to cross the road using at the kerb, look and listen for traffic and then decide whether it is safe to cross.

Park a few streets away and walk your child 6 to school to reduce congestion and improve safety. This is also good exercise and helps teach your child road safety rules.

Parking safely around schools



Parking safely around schools

We all know parking and traffic around school can be frustrating but going against the road rules places not only your child's life at risk, but those of others. Tragedies can occur if care is not taken to abide by these rules.

Common Parking Restrictions



No Parking Sgns

You may use this area for drop off and pick up only, for a maximum of 2 minutes. You must not queue or wait here. The driver must remain with the vehicle.

Kiss and Drop Zones

are generally near the school gates and are designated by 'No Parking' signs.

Here are some key reminders when entering a Kiss and

- Follow the rules of 'No Parking' signs
- Be mindful of others who are also dropping off their children
- Keep an eye out for children crossing the road when exiting the Kiss and Drop Zone
- Be mindful that queuing for the Kiss and Drop zone may result in other breaches to the road rules
- If your child is unable to enter/exit the vehicle and enter the school independently, consider parking and walking your child in

No Stopping Signs/ Yellow Lines Both No Stopping Signs and Yellow Lines

mean the same thing. There might be one or the other or both. Drivers must not stop on a length of road to which restrictions applies, even if you are stopping for a

short period to pick up a child. Stopping here may cause a traffic hazard as well as congestion. You cannot stop near a school crossing, always follow the signs and yellow lines.

Bus Zone Signs

You must not stop within a bus zone at any time. This zone is only available to public buses. If there are no signs, you are not allowed to stop within 20 metres of the approach to a bus stop or within 10 metres of the departure side.

Double Parking

Drivers must not stop next to a vehicle already stopped or parked at the kerb at any time. This practice is illegal and creates dangerous situations for traffic flow and for pedestrians
